Introduction

Welcome to the Spanish department. We hope that this *pack* will help you find your way successfully through your A level in Spanish.

You will find studying a foreign language at A level is very different to what you have been used to at GCSE level but we think that you will find it much more enjoyable, relevant, thought provoking, exciting and challenging. What more could you ask for!

Your Spanish teachers will support and guide you through the course but there are lots of ways in which you can help yourself.

- You can start by becoming familiar with the demands of the course.
- Keep up to date with what is going on around you in the world and in particular Spain and Latin America
- Read articles and stories in Spanish
- You should listen to as much Spanish as possible. This could be listening to the radio, watching TV, listening to music, podcasts or watching Spanish language films
- Write down new vocabulary as you meet it. Don't wait to be reminded to write it down!
- Keep to deadlines for all your work. It is better for you and your teachers and ensures constant feedback on your progress.
- You will need a larger dictionary than at GCSE.
- Weekly attendance with the Spanish Language Assistant in preparation for the Speaking examination.

What do you need to know or be able to do before taking this course?

Most students should normally have achieved at least the equivalent of a grade B at GCSE Spanish before taking the course. You will need to feel confident at this level in the four skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing. You must also have some knowledge and understanding of the culture and way of life of Spanish speaking countries. You need to be interested in developing this understanding and in exploring in much more depth the topic areas that you will have covered at GCSE.

What will you learn on this course?

The course will help you to develop your general study skills, but most of all you will learn to communicate at a higher level in Spanish. You will also learn much more about a range of aspects of the societies in which Spanish is spoken.

- **Reading**

You will be able to read, understand and extract information from written passages in Spanish taken from authentic sources.

- **Listening**

You will be able to listen to, and understand contemporary spoken language and answer questions on what you have heard. The passages that you will listen to are taken from a range of sources.

- **Speaking and writing**

You will learn how to write essays or longer pieces and hold conversations and discussions in Spanish. You will learn all the appropriate grammar, words and phrases that will help you to present information in Spanish, organise your arguments, provide opinions and analyse your ideas.

What kind of student is this course suitable for?

If you are interested in languages and communication, and you enjoy learning about other cultures and ways of life, then this course could be suitable for you. Similarly, if you are interested in the business world, in travel

and tourism, in literature or in journalism and the media, then you are also likely to find the course appropriate. There are a number of options in the course where you can choose your topic or question to suit your interests. Whether you want to use Spanish for work, for further study, training or for leisure, this course will help equip you with the necessary skills and knowledge.

Remember!

- Be aware of the requirements of the exam and work towards them.
- Remember, success at AS and A2 requires you to do as much outside of the classroom as in it!
- Your notes will be the main part of your revision so it is important to establish a system, early on, to keep your notes in order.

- You will encounter a lot of new vocabulary as you learn a language. It is vital to have a coherent system to note this down and learn it. Aim to learn / revise a few words each day. The most efficient way to learn vocabulary and phrases is to do a little but often.
